The Dragon School's Social Impact Programme has made remarkable strides this term, reflecting our community's commitment to philanthropy. Our collective efforts have raised over £6000 for our chosen school charities, Asylum Welcome, FareShare and World Land Trust, taking the total raised this year to over £11,000 and counting! Our students have shown incredible initiative and creativity, engaging in a diverse range of fundraising activities across the term, including a Reception Jog Along, Year 3 Art Exhibition, the Boarders' Fayre and the A Block Revue to name but a few.

Over 152 young Dragons also took part in the annual Marlborough Schools Triathlon in aid of Restless Development. Our kitchen staff have generously prepared dozens of hot meals for the local community and the Dragon Community

Larder, in collaboration with Oxford Food Hub, has successfully gathered 20 boxes of food and essentials. We've also had the pleasure of hosting children from Wheatley Primary School for our weekly Quest sessions and from Chilworth specialist school for a wonderful Gamelan Day of Indonesian music, dance and art. Looking forward to the summer holidays, we are delighted to be welcoming children from Asylum Welcome to our Summer Residential Camp, joining students from all over the world for a range of activities including English and Maths lessons, and of course lots of fun and games across the Dragon site.

As always, we would like to offer our huge thanks for your unwavering support towards these initiatives and helping us to foster a culture where the children learn to appreciate that even small steps can lead to significant positive change.

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
It is hard to believe how much our Reception class has grown in their first year of school. It has been wonderful to be a part of and lots of memories have been created. This term witnessed an opportunity for our youngest and our oldest Dragons to work together. Reception headed to the Prep school for a workshop on monsters devised by the PEG children. This included a poetry performance from the older children, creative workshop to design and make their own monster puppet, Al animation of their own drawings, stories in the Prep school library, a monster party and a parade organised!

We have also been learning phonic sounds and working on learning to read and write. Class assemblies have been brilliant as the children's confidence continues to grow. This was also seen at the Reception Summer Concert where all children played instruments and sang songs. We enjoyed hosting our parents for our open phonics lessons and, of course, the first Sports Day where all the children did fantastically well. Break The Rules Day will absolutely go down as a highlight for the teachers as much as the children!

The Summer Term has been full of fun, learning and excitement for Year 1. In the first half of term, the children worked with dedication towards their play, 'The Adventures of Egg Box Dragon', which they performed with enthusiasm to the school, their parents and the daughter of the author of the book, Richard Adams. They were rewarded with a trip to the Cotswold Wildlife Park (train ride and ice creams included) to consolidate all their learning on animal classification. In Summer 2, they embarked on a new core text, Pattan's Pumpkin, learning about India, plant structures and plant life cycles. They were treated to a spice workshop with Ma Michelle in the kitchen where they discussed how different plants and spices are used in India and the UK, followed by a masterclass in making samosas. Each week, Year I also delighted the school with their class assemblies, full of laughter and joyful singing!

In the first half of term, Year 2 had a brilliant trip to Winchester Science Museum to expand on our topic 'Space'. Here we immersed ourselves in "all things space" and had a lot of fun considering the things we would pack if we were going into space. To coincide with this, the children were given a spec to consider whilst building their very own space buggies on DT Day. The end results were fabulous! This year's theme of Science Week was everything to do with 'Time'. Professor Bubbleworks came in to inspire and wow the children in an afternoon of learning and laughter. In the second half of term, we had a fantastic trip to Uni Parks to look at the Swift Tower. We also did some observational drawings, had a picnic in the park and went to the National History Museum to see the swifts' nesting places. Our Swimming Festival and Sports Day were also highlights for Year 2.

This term Year 3 put on an incredible and energetic performance of 'The King Who Banned The Dark' to the Pre-Prep and their parents. What a triumph it was! The Summer Art Exhibition showcased Year 3's architectural drawings of Oxford, and raised over £1200 for our partner charity, Asylum Welcome. Our Music Maker concert celebrated the children's talents and progress on their instruments whilst Sports Day saw the House captains of Phoenix lifting the winning House Cup! It has also been a term about transitioning and making sure the children feel as excited and comfortable as possible moving on to the Prep. They enjoyed a day in E Block, getting a feel for life and routines in Year 4, and the Sports Festival that was held at the Prep with E Block was a great afternoon of tennis and cricket skills with Year 4.









It has been wonderful seeing E Block gain confidence during their first year at the Prep. Academically, they have worked hard and proved themselves as curious, eager learners. They have represented the school in a multitude of sports, cheering each other on and enjoying being part of a team. E Block managed the residential brilliantly and approached all the activities with delight and gusto. From a musical perspective, they are a talented year group, and it has been super to see so many of them improving. E Block have stepped up and raised money from their "Cake Bake" and of course at the Dragon Sale. I am so proud of them all for a coming to school with a consistently positive attitude and celebrating each other's successes.

It has been an action-packed term in Middle School, where the Summer Term arrived with an unseasonal chill followed by a heatwave so the children were never sure whether to wear thermals or shorts! We have had concerts, our MS play, Form Athletics, lessons on the fields, Prize-Giving, and trips to Warwick Castle and Portsmouth, which were interspersed with exams for academics,

music and drama.

Now Sports Day is complete and the Middle School, both teachers and pupils, can take the long summer holidays to rest and recover from all the excitement to start again in September.

Energy, commitment, service, courage, kindness and fun are some of the words that come to mind when we think back to this last year in Upper School. Pluses for the children have been at a record high this term, with many recognised for showing the Dragon Values. It was wonderful at Prize-Giving to have all children stand and be applauded, by parents and the staff, for all their hard work. 
Earlier in the term, all of D Block engaged their audience in the Bards of Bardwell Road showcase performance.

Shakespeare plays in about 65mins – quite an effort! Some great performances were seen.


The B Block Studio production, performed in the Rink, by a cast of around 30 B Blockers, was thoroughly entertaining.

Other highlights were the annual PEG plays, the A Block revue, a new addition to the calendar in the form of the E Block form plays and a thoroughly successful C Block trip to the Oxford Playhouse to see 'The 39 Steps'.

As if all of that wasn't enough, a small team of A and B Blockers are just beginning to rehearse their performance for the Dragons' first tour to the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. The cast will be performing six times over the course of a week in a professional environment at the world's largest arts festival. Their production has been created by Dragon staff (Mr CJ, Mr Ponder, Mr Dickson and Mr Morris) and can be found under the title 'Behind the Curtain' on the Edinburgh Fringe website.

This Summer Term our boys and girls have played in 323 cricket fixtures, which represents an increase on last year and is testament to our ongoing aim of improving our participation rates and inclusivity.

Girls' cricket continues to develop and we are incredibly pleased with the increased amount of hardball cricket that is now being introduced across the Middle and Upper School teams. The girls' 1st XI have had an excellent season and reached the semi-final of the IAPS tournament and there have been some very encouraging performances from our U10 and U11 teams.

Boys' cricket continues to flourish; the 1st XI had an excellent season and reached the regional final of the National Cup (where they lost out to KES Birmingham). The U10A team had numerous successes in tournaments including Oratory and St Edward's.

We have continued to expand our fixture provision for E Block boys and girls and our Friday Festival afternoons – hosted at Bardwell

Road – have been very popular and successful.

Our swimmers have excelled once more, with an extraordinary 30 Dragons qualified for the IAPS national finals (in relays and individual events) held at the Aquatics Centre in London, where they performed with distinction.

Our athletes have had a fantastic season, where our boys' and girls' teams enjoyed numerous successes in inter-school competitions including events at Stowe and Winchester House. Forty-nine athletes competed at the Mercia Regional Finals in Malvern and seven Dragons will go on to compete in the national finals, which will be held in Birmingham, in July.

Our tennis teams saw a greater number of fixtures this year and we've been delighted in the increased participation in our afterschool clubs. Children have also represented the school at sculling, tennis, judo, fencing, sailing, real tennis, horse riding and polo.





BOARDING DRAGONS

The Summer Term is a highlight in the boarding year with the relaxed evenings spent on the fields after Prep and time spent socializing with friends. Dragon Boarding continues to thrive, and April saw a record number of children try their hand at boarding in our 3rd Annual Boarding Week. They took part in karaoke sessions, swimming parties, inflatables on the fields, eating Mr Whippy ice creams and a neon disco in the Forum. The rising numbers of flexible boarders joining the full boarders has seen Houses collaborating and taking part in regular combined events. These have ranged from fire pits, watching movies in our Dragon outdoor cinema, games evenings and strawberry picking.

The final In-School Weekend saw the boarders making some incredible memories and celebrating the end of the year by taking part in trips to Wet n Wild, surfing at the Wave at Bristol, river trips in Oxford, trips to the beach for kayaking and paddleboarding, celebrating the inaugural Stradstonbury Festival, punting, picnics and formal dinners. What a brilliant culmination to another successful year of Dragon Boarding!









SCHOLARSHIPS

We have had a record-breaking crop of scholarships this year, with 77 scholarships and an additional six awards. This is such a fantastic result and a testament to the hard work and dedication that the A Block have shown over the years, and the teachers who have supported them on this journey. A Block sat Common Entrance exams in early June and were able to celebrate the whole year group moving on to their chosen senior schools in September. To help with this transition, we were joined by representatives from 22 senior schools for our Future Schools Day on Friday 21st June to

speak with their prospective pupils.

There have been a variety of Future Schools events ranging from our E Block Future Schools Forum, giving an overview of the process of helping parents navigate the senior school admissions processes and finding the right school for each child, through to our Parent Forum with visiting Heads and registrars from five top co-ed senior boarding schools.
